

What we are up to

Community Conversation in Maryvale: Strong Families, Thriving Children

DSCS partnered with Mountain Park Health - Maryvale and Arizona Town Hall to host and facilitate a community conversation: Strong Families, Thriving Children. Maryvale families and adolescent service providers were invited to discuss how we can collectively support families and children so that they are better able to overcome risk factors such as adverse childhood experiences and economic downturns. The insights gathered from the families and care providers will be used to guide our work. A report from the Community Conversation was shared by Arizona Town Hall can be found here.

G.A.I.N. Event at Davidson Elementary School

DSCS recruited community partners and ASU volunteers to participate in the Getting Arizona Involved in Neighborhoods (G.A.I.N) day, organized by the Estrella Supermoms and Davidson Elementary School in the Cartwright Elementary School District. G.A.I.N events occurred simultaneously throughout the day, and over 1,000 people participated in this fun and informative event.



MyPlan Training: Spanish Adaptation for Maryvale Community Leaders DSCS partnered with ASU's School of Social Work and the Survivor Link team to introduce MyPlan, an educational tool in both English and Spanish used to educate and promote awareness around healthy relationships and domestic violence.

Throughout the training, the Supermoms provided feedback to Survivor Link to better adapt their training for the Maryvale Community. This ignited conversations within our team on how to partner with our colleagues to promote awareness around healthy relationships in Maryvale.

El Oso Park Community Clean-up

DSCS joined the Estrella Supermoms, Vice Mayor Betty Guardado, the City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department and Maryvale Revitalization Corporation in a Community Street Clean-up adjacent to El Oso Park.



The primary focus of the clean-up was an alleyway reportedly used by over 100 students each day as a route to walk to school. The City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department picked up all trash collected, including broken glass, mattresses and discarded furniture.



What's next?

One Design Studio, Two One Square Miles

Maryvale is a big place (over 230,000 people covering more than 36 square miles), so we have narrowed our initial focus to two distinct One Square Mile areas. By approaching our mission, "one square mile at a time," we aim to measure the collective work of ourselves and our partners against data available within specific census tracts. We're happy to announce the first two One Square Miles (OSMs) are within the Cartwright and Isaac school districts (see maps).





Within each One Square Mile, we will work closely with community partners, neighborhood groups, schools, health clinics, businesses, city government and funders. The One Square Mile Initiative's goal is to help develop and support increased community leadership, services and quality of life.

Community Champions

The One Square Mile team is now consulting with two amazing Community Champions. The champions are people with expertise and in-depth knowledge of the One Square Mile areas and the social, cultural and educational assets of the community.

Karolina is a preschool teacher at Bret Tarver Isaac Preschool. She is experienced in coordinated outreach to the community in early childhood education, voter registration and family engagement.
